The Women's Auxiliary Food Kitchen was open to the striker's families. Le Sueur's description of the kitchen showed the work was demanding and endless. She joined in with other women and family of the strikers in preparing and serving food, washing dishes and pouring coffee.

The Women's Auxiliary Infirmary provided safe space for exhausted and injured strikers to rest and recover from the violence.

The Women's Alliance Protest at Minneapolis City Hall Against Violence depicts women adding their voices in nonviolent protest against the Citizens Alliance and business owners instigating the violence.
